Confirmed Jon Imhoff will plow/salt parking lot, he donated last years services. Installed driveway/lot markers.


- Replaced bulb in south steeple light, sanctuary roof.

Begin each day this New Year by asking the Lord to help your new person shine over the old person. Ask Him to shine through you so the new is shining through and the old is gone.






Men's Bible Study

Mary's Meanderings – January 2022


The Three Kings

Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the king, behold, Wisemen from the east came to Jerusalem saying, Where is He that is born King of the Jews? For we saw His star in the east, and come to worship Him. And when Herod the king heard it, he was troubled, and all Jerusalem with him. And gathering together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ should be born. And they said unto him, in Bethlehem of Judaea: for thus it is written through the prophet. Matthew 2:1-5.

Pastor Ruthie told us last Sunday that there were two Bethlehems in Israel which was new to me. What was that star? It's been said that it was the North Star. The North Star, Polaris, sits above the North Pole. Western tradition holds that there were three kings. Others say there may have been more, possibly twelve. According to some writings, the Kings were Melchior from Europe, Caspar from Arabia, and Balthazar from Africa. They travelled by horse, camel, and elephant to present the baby Jesus with three symbolic gifts: gold, because Jesus was royalty, frankincense which represented the baby's holy nature as the Son of God, and myrrh to signify Jesus' mortality.

In the United States we do not make much of a deal over the three kings but it is actually commemorated in churches every year on January 6, which is the twelfth day after Christmas, thus the song The Twelve Days of Christmas. In places that celebrate it there is a traditional holiday bread. The bread is round in shape as a symbol of a king's crown. Baked inside of the bread is a clay or porcelain baby Jesus figurine. Whoever finds it must then host a party on Dia de la Candelaria, or the Day of Candles, February 2. I think all we know of February 2 in Ground Hog's Day!

The three kings or Magi were both real and symbolic. As real men the three kings confirmed ancient prophecies about Jesus being the Messiah and as symbols, they showed that He came to save all people, rich and poor, learned or unschooled, from anywhere in the world. As wealthy travelers they were on the opposite end of the social and economic spectrum as the shepherds who had visited right after His birth. The wise men traveled thousands of miles to worship Jesus. Wise people acknowledge their need for a Savior and seek to find Him. Foolish and evil people like Herod get upset with Him and seek to be rid of Him. How far will you go to follow Jesus?





We are blessed!
